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## CIDQ

The Council for Interior Design Qualification (CIDQ) is the premier certifying organization for interior design professionals. CIDQ develops and administers the three-part NCIDQ Examination, which tests interior designers' knowledge of core competencies required for professional practice in the industry. The exam is based on CIDQ's independent, comprehensive analysis of the profession and the daily practice of interior design in a range of DQ continually undates the exam content to ensure it reflects the most current skills required to design secure

settings. CIDQ continually updates the exam content to ensure it reflects the most current skills required to design secure, functional, and safe interior spaces.

CIDQ is comprised of regulatory boards from across the United States and Canada. As such, the organization takes seriously its responsibility to protect the public's health, safety, and welfare. NCIDQ Certification meets legal and regulatory standards for the interior design profession as established by more than half of the states across the U.S. and the provinces in Canada.

Since 1974, CIDQ's mission has been to create, test, and promote guidelines for determining competency in the practice of interior design. NCIDQ Certification has been the global standard for interior design professionals for 50 years.

NCIDQ Certification assures interior designers are competent to meet industry standards not only for aesthetics but also for public health, safety, and welfare. To date, more than 38,000 people around the world have earned NCIDQ Certification.

## **CEO's Message**



Thom Banks Chief Executive Officer

The end of a year is always a good time to reflect upon what has been accomplished and what remains to be done. This is even truer this year as CIDQ marks its 50th anniversary, and for me personally as I prepare to retire from CIDQ next March during what will be my tenth year with the organization.

The NCIDQ Exam's assessment of practitioner competence remains the foundation of our mission. 2024 marks the completion of a new practice analysis, an exercise we conduct every five years to ensure the exam is aligned with current practice. The survey input of more than 2,300 practitioners is currently being reviewed and analyzed. The findings will continue to evolve the exam content and our assessment techniques

when implemented for the spring 2026 testing administration. In addition, a comprehensive exam security audit we completed earlier this year will result in the addition of a host of enhanced security measures to our already rigorous processes over the next 18 months.

So much has changed on our exam front over the last ten years; the computerization of the last hand drawn exam section (Practicum), the addition of innovative item types, administering the NCIDQ Exam globally, pivoting to offer remote proctoring following COVID, offering preliminary scoring results for the IDFX and IDPX exams, combatting increasingly sophisticated threats to exam security, and the promise (and threat) of Artificial Intelligence to name just a few. As a small organization, it isn't easy, but CIDQ has remained an alert, informed and proactive member of the testing community and vigilant stewards of the NCIDQ Exam so that we may grow and adapt to the changing needs of our candidates and design community.

Legislatively, CIDQ and its allies continue to advocate for the expansion of public protection, adding jurisdictions which legally recognize NCIDQ Certified interior designers as design professionals. This year, legislation creating or expanding regulation of the interior design profession was considered in six states, and passed in two, Nebraska and Oklahoma. Nebraska, where interior design was previously unregulated, passed a title act, while Oklahoma converted their title act into a practice act bringing our total to 30 regulated U.S. jurisdictions and eight out of 10 Canadian provinces.

We are gaining traction, making more regulatory progress in the last three years than has occurred in the prior twenty. That's not the result of just our efforts, but rather a confluence of events. The CIDQ Board's decision to position the organization as leaders on the advocacy front, both independently with the addition of dedicated advocacy staff and funding, as well as in coordination with the interior design professional membership organizations, has accelerated progress in securing practice regulation. So have the meaningful relationships CIDQ has fostered with our fellow ICOR organizations CLARB, NCARB, and NCEES. Their acknowledgment of the profession's impact on protecting the public and our various collaborations including our current Practice Overlap Task Force work and the NCARB/CIDQ Practice Analysis/Exam Blueprint comparison have undoubtedly raised our profile and I am grateful for their collegiality and progressive thinking. Interior design remains a widely misconstrued profession, but public understanding and awareness of what NCIDQ Certified interior designers actually do in their practice directly affects legislators' willingness to take action. CIDQ is proactively addressing that with a public awareness campaign currently being piloted across the U.S. and Canada on National Public Radio and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. This exciting and unprecedented initiative imprints the value of our NCIDO Certification on the public consciousness and exposes more people to the realities of professional interior design practice. We've received a lot of positive feedback and I'm excited to review the data on its impact when the pilot concludes in late November.

As CIDQ prepares to embark on its next 50 years, it will undoubtedly face changes, challenges, and opportunities in the years ahead. The world is getting smaller with greater interest in international standardization and mobility, traditional competency assessment pathways are being reevaluated, and the pace of technological innovation promises to continue to disrupt our orthodoxies. Thanks to the support and expertise of our regulatory board membership, volunteers, and CIDQ headquarters team, the organization is well positioned for continued success in the years ahead. It's been a privilege to witness and support the growth of the Council and the recognition of the profession's impact on public safety by the larger design community. I'm confident when CIDQ looks back on its 100th anniversary (in 2074!), it will do so from an even greater position of stature, accomplishment, and success. Thanks for letting me be a part of this fantastic organization!

## **2024 Accomplishments CONTINUED**

#### **Practice Analysis**

Approximately every five years, CIDQ conducts a Practice Analysis study to identify the knowledge, skills, and abilities that interior designers need to have. This study helps support the validity of the NCIDQ Exam.

A Committee of a diverse group of NCIDQ Certificate holders was assembled to define the tasks performed by interior designers along with the knowledge, skills, and abilities needed to perform those tasks. A survey was distributed to NCIDQ Certificate holders, NCIDQ Exam candidates in the pipeline, and members of interior design membership organizations to validate the tasks identified.

The survey results were reviewed by a subset of the original committee with the result being the development of new exam blueprints upon which the NCIDQ Exam will be based beginning in 2026.

#### **Exam Security and Access**

CIDQ conducted an Exam Security Audit to enhance its exam security framework throughout the lifecycle of the NCIDQ Exam. It included evaluating and analyzing the risks associated with the application process, test development, administering the exam, and scoring and reporting the exam results.

As a result of the audit, a series of recommendations were provided to CIDQ to enhance our exam security framework and better deter, detect, and decide how to handle identified risks. The recommendations were grouped into near-, short-, mid-, and long-term goals and addressed content protection, foundational & security capabilities, eligibility and test administration, and organization & governance.

#### **Digital Badge program**



As a value-add to our active NCIDQ Certificate holders, CIDQ partnered with Credly, the most comprehensive and connected digital credentialing solution, to offer a digital version of the NCIDQ credential for our certificate holders to showcase their accomplishments, digitally.

#### **Public Awareness Campaigns**

CIDQ launched two pilot public awareness campaigns, simultaneously in the States and Canada. The campaigns on National Public Radio (NPR) and Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) are intended to change and strengthen the public's understanding of NCIDQ Certification's value, as a necessary safeguard to protect public health, safety, and welfare.

#### Advocacy/Legislative Progress

CIDQ is thrilled to be able to report, yet again, the substantial amount of progress we and our allies have made in advocating for reasonable regulation of the interior design profession. Not only have we worked to support member boards in their work to address legislative inquiries and successfully fight against deregulatory efforts, but through our efforts with the <u>Consortium for Interior Design</u>, more states are seeing the value in protecting the public through reasonable regulation.

Two states have successfully passed legislation this year, In Nebraska, language creating a voluntary title act was incorporated into LB 16, an omnibus occupational regulation reform bill that passed the Senate with majority support and was signed into law by Governor Jim Pillen on March 5. This language was the result of several meetings and hours of negotiations between the architecture, engineering, and interior design communities in Nebraska.

The other state was Oklahoma. This bill was notable for several reasons, both for what it does and for how it was developed. HB 1793, which was signed into law by Governor Kevin Stitt on April 26, converts the state's title act regulating commercial interior designers and providing voluntary registration into a practice act requiring licensure for NCIDQ Certified practitioners working in a defined scope of practice. This bill continues the collaboration between design professions facilitated by the Oklahoma Board of Architects, Landscape Architects, and Licensed Interior Designers. This collaborative effort is to be celebrated, and the role the board has taken in supporting an active dialogue between design professions is one that CIDQ hopes to see emulated across the United States.

We are also celebrating another successful year of active advocacy efforts supported by the <u>Consortium</u> <u>for Interior Design</u>, the collaborative effort between CIDQ and the interior design professional societies: the <u>American Society for Interior Designers (ASID)</u> and the <u>International Interior Design Association (IIDA)</u>. Thanks to this collaboration, several states, including New York, Missouri, Michigan, and Alaska were able to work towards the introduction of legislation setting up or strengthening reasonable regulation, and we fully expect that number to grow in 2025 and beyond. We deeply appreciate the support from the design community for the unified front of the Consortium, and we look forward to continuing our work advocating for the health, safety, and welfare of the public.

Following the legislative success of the U.S.-focused Consortium for Interior Design, CIDQ is finalizing a Canadian Advocacy Collaborative with the <u>Interior</u> <u>Designers of Canada (IDC)</u> to support the Canadian provincial pursuit of the shared goal of advocating for reasonable interior design regulation.

The Model Legislation Task Force was created to update and modernize outdated 2010 model language to provide a resource to regulated and unregulated jurisdictions alike. The Task Force brought together several valuable and different professional perspectives, including dual design practitioners, educators, member board executives, and an attorney. This group worked diligently for more than a year to review the language and incorporate model statutory language developed by the Federation of Associations of Regulatory Boards (FARB), language developed by state design communities, and incorporate member board feedback into a fully updated draft of model legislation. The updated draft will be brought to the CIDQ Assembly of Delegates for an adoption vote at the Annual Meeting in Chicago in November.

CIDQ continues to support cross-organizational collaboration through efforts such as the ICOR Practice Overlap Task Force (POTF). This substantial effort, on behalf of the <u>Interorganizational Council on</u> <u>Regulation (ICOR)</u>, continues its work to identify areas of acceptable overlap and scope distinction between the professions of architecture, engineering and land surveying, interior design, and landscape architecture. Each organization (CIDQ, <u>CLARB</u>, <u>NCARB</u>, and <u>NCEES</u>) has provided its members with an update on the Task Force's progress and examples of the resources being developed at our respective annual meetings, which has been largely met with enthusiasm and excitement for the potential impact on how jurisdictions manage incidental practice.

#### **Data Analysis**

CIDQ added a business intelligence analyst to the HQ team to help us translate our data into meaningful insights to support data-based organizational designmaking and to drive business success.

#### New Work Experience Requirement Improvements

CIDQ believes broad-based work experience is vital to ensuring interior designers are qualified to protect the public. Earlier this year, we implemented new work experience requirements to formalize reporting, maintain comparable standards with other regulated professions, and support more consistent training.

While total hourly work experience prerequisites remain unchanged, the new requirements establish minimum hourly thresholds that must be met within each design category. In addition, all work experience must be obtained within 10 years before the date of application submission to be considered.

## Interior Design vs Interior Decoration Video

CIDQ developed and launched a brief <u>video</u> to show the professional difference between an NCIDQ Certified interior designer and an interior decorator, as many use the terms interchangeably, but the professions differ in critical ways.

#### **Publications**

CIDQ redesigned and improved our quarterly newsletter, *Q Connection*, and segmented our audience to convey more relevant and specific messaging to our members and NCIDQ Certificate holders.


CIDQ launched a new bi-annual newsletter, *Q Fit*, to deliver the latest news to interested parties who subscribe to our mailing list.


#### THREE YEAR OPERATIONAL REVENUE VS. EXPENSES COMPARISON



Vincent has been an NCIDQ Certificate holder for 35 years and has served as a volunteer for NCIDQ/CIDQ in numerous capacities, including as a Juror, Jury Team Leader, Jury Chair, Master Juror, Exam Committee, Restructuring Task Force, Vice President of Exam Production, National Legislative Council for Interior Design (NLCID) Representative, CIDQ Board Member, as well as the CIDQ President in 1996.

In an unprecedented nomination period, Vincent received a total of seven (7) nominations, all of whom spoke highly of Vincent's volunteer initiatives. In one nomination statement, Sooz Klinkhamer stated Vincent is "like-minded in terms of what the future might hold for professional interior designers. He is interested in teaching design in various capacities and willing to devote significant time to grassroots work to further the recognition of the interior design profession in North America."

Additionally, Felice Silverman stated the "most remarkable experience is when I see individuals approach him and tell him what an impact he has had on their career. To me, there is no better indicator of impact than seeing the direct effect on people you have mentored, and Vincent has so positively affected so many designers."

Vincent Carter had this to say about the acknowledgment, "I met Louis Tregre around 1987 in Washington, DC when he spoke to the Washington, D.C. Board of Interior Designers to encourage us to consider adoption of the NCIDQ Exam as the measure of professionalism for interior design. I was one of the initial five members of the board, which was one of the early practice acts. I believe in volunteerism and have done so my entire career. When I speak or serve as a mentor, I stress how to prepare for the NCIDQ Exam and the importance of representing the interior design profession."

Created in 1991 to honor the memory of **Louis S. Tregre**, the founding director of CIDQ, the award salutes volunteers who have worked diligently and consistently at the grassroots level to further the goals of CIDQ, the NCIDQ Examination, and to advance the profession of interior design.










DAVID COX PUBLIC MEMBER


